# CEO Message

We are entering September 2020 with many weighty issues in front of us, including one that is very close to the heart of Hospice – the upcoming referendum on the End of Life Act.

Given you are a loyal supporter, we wanted to ensure you know where we as a Hospice stand in relation to euthanasia.

At its July meeting, the Otago Community Hospice Board decided that we will be a euthanasia-free service, and our staff will not assess for eligibility or deliver assisted dying should the Act come into force.

A fundamental principle of hospice and palliative care is to neither hasten nor postpone the natural progression of death. Consistent with this principle, we believe that euthanasia or assisted dying has no place in hospice or palliative care.

In the event that this referendum passes, we will respect a patient's decision should they choose the option of assisted dying and continue to provide the same compassionate care as we would any patient referred to our service.

Even though our staff will not assess eligibility for assisted dying, nor deliver or be present during the administration of lethal doses of medication, our standard of care for patients will continue no matter what an individual's choice may be.

Our decision to be a 'euthanasia-free' service is supported by a declaratory judgement from the High Court in May around specific questions in relation to the End of Life Choice Act including whether an organisation such as a hospice can conscientiously object to assisted dying and operate a 'euthanasia-free' service.

The Court ruled that organisations such as hospices have a right of conscientious objection, and further that this is a right protected under the New Zealand Bill of Rights Act.

As we head closer to the referendum we hope people start talking about how our community, in particular our colleagues in the health sector, will respond to this new legislation.

This is a very complex situation and we all need to be prepared as to how each of us will move forward if the referendum goes through.

Our team supports people with a terminal illness to live and die well, and we remain dedicated to responding to the unique,



complex needs of every patient and their family/whānau utilising our specialist expertise in end-of-life issues. This will not change, so regardless of where your vote lies in regards to the referendum, we urge you to continue your amazing support of our community Hospice serving the people who really need us 24/7 throughout the year, no matter what their end-of-life choice.

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## **Central Otago Team Doubled**



Central Otago has seen significant growth in patients needing specialist palliative care over the last 18 months, so the area has been a key focus of Hospice service planning. We've worked very hard across the last year to boost the team and we now have four care coordinators, a nurse practitioner, a spiritual care coordinator, a social worker and a counsellor working across the Central Otago region. This team is well supported by regular specialist palliative doctor visits. Patients and their families also have access to night carers, a biography service and 24/7 phone support.

As part of its broader remit, Hospice also provides GP and primary health care provider support and education. Earlier this year the Hospice brought the Kowhai Programme – education for informal carers – to Wanaka and Alexandra, making a significant difference to those family members caring for loved ones at home.

All the aged care facilities in the region are supported by the first Southern-based Hospice Nurse Practitioner, Louisa Ingham.

Wanaka-based Ms Ingham says living and working in a small community can be a challenge for the team, who routinely met clients or their families in the supermarket or cafe.

"A lot of people ask why you would want to work with death or dying but it is so rewarding, getting to know families and work with them potentially over an extended period of time. You develop a professional bond with families in their hardest times. Our service is often like being a midwife, but at the opposite end of the spectrum. When I started with hospice eight years ago we had 15 patients. Now we sit at around 50, sometimes more."

The Hospice has been well supported by Central Lakes Trust, The Trust Community Foundation, The Lion Foundation, The Upper Clutha Hospice Trust, the Wanaka BNI chapter and Pioneer Energy. We are also incredibly grateful to those who regularly support our Cromwell and Alexandra shops with both donations and being loyal shoppers, helping us raise much-needed funds for the service.



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With lock down in the rear view mirror, but with so many businesses and people reeling from the effects of Covid, Otago Community Hospice decided something fun was required for the beginning of our financial year. It was decided that people getting their shorts on and their winter legs out on July 3rd would be just the ticket. It is the first time we've run this event and the key objective was to have fun and if you also gathered a few gold coins for Hospice while having a laugh, then even better. There were knobbly knees, hairy legs and plenty of goose bumps as hemlines were raised in the bitter cold of that fine and VERY frosty Friday to help raise funds for Otago Hospice. We had set our target low at \$1,000 for the day – given it was a first and the Covid-effect. But with small and large contributions here and there, we raised over \$2,200. Using these chairs means patient carers and relatives are not trying to lift patients. We're so grateful for this practical gift; it's amazing to be in a position to have such a strong chair pool, so no one will go without this very useful aid."
